

Instant Analysis: Browns at Broncos

As he will all season for us here on TCF, Mansfield Lucas checks in with us for his Instant Analysis on last night's Browns - Broncos game. Mansfield also asks what K2 did to justify his first quarter benching, and opines on the run defense.
