



### **James, Pierce Sit This One Out**

With LeBron James resting, and Paul Pierce out with a season ending elbow injury, Larry Hughes took a big step towards getting back to 100%, leading the Cavs to a 93-88 win that wasn't nearly as close as the final score suggested.

Hughes, making his 3<sup>rd</sup> straight start, scored 21 points and added 6 assists and 5 steals in 38 minutes.
