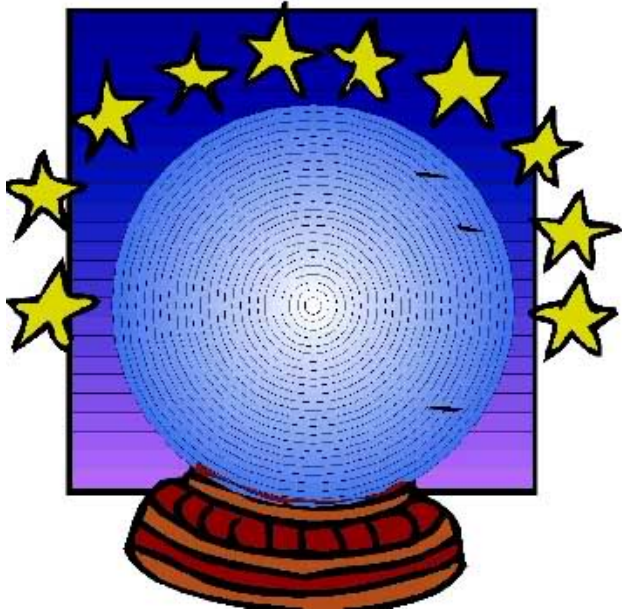


The Crystal Ball - Nov 23 Releases

Traditionally a great week for new releases at the theaters, this Thanksgiving is no exception to that rule. There's something for everyone...animated family film, sappy family film, horror film, urban comedy, action/adventure video game adapted film, and the nationwide release of one of the most critically acclaimed films this year.
